1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The Institute is affiliated to Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University and hence follows the curriculum prescribed by it. BOS (Board of Studies) members and subject experts designs the syllabus of various subjects at university level and is followed by institute. Institutional committee including Principal prepare the well defined academic calendar and time table prior to the start of each session and ensures its effective delivery. Academic calendar and time table are uploaded to website and display on all notice boards to make aware all the students about curricular and co-curricular activities to be conducted throughout the session. In the beginning of each session, HoDs and Principal allocate the subjects and workload to teachers as per the University guidelines. Teachers are asked to use appropriate teaching aids/audio/videos and PPTs to ensure good curriculum delivery. Due importance is given to the dissertation of the PG students. Class attendance is monitored by each subject teacher. Institute organizes Parent -Teacher meet to engage these stake holders in the overall development of students as well as institute. Feedback from all stake holders are collected and analyzed for

proper implementation of the curriculum and action to be taken. Along with academic excellence, Institute emphasis on conduct of extracurricular activities which includes cultural programs, Guest lectures of experts from academia and industry, intercollegiate debate competition, sports activities, seminar by students, their participation in various competitions etc. The curriculum is enhanced through conduct of study tours and industrial visits giving insights beyond the syllabus. 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2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The institution has an informal mentoring system. The teachers mentor the students in academic, career-related, interpersonal, family and psychological issues. The details of the students' names, issues discussed and

solution given is mentioned by the teachers in their respective daily diaries. Teachers are appointed as Class Incharges at the beginning of the session and the same is conveyed to students via What's App groups and circulars. The students contact the concerned Class In-charge to discuss issues in case they need assistance. A follow-up is also taken by the teachers after regular interval. The advanced learners are provided with extra opportunities for further growth. While students facing problems with their regular subjects, are given extra time by the teachers. The Class In-charges submit their diaries to the Chief Mentors appointed for the purpose. Their signatures are taken on the mentoring data at the end of the session. Sensitive information of the students is not recorded in the diaries as the diaries also carry other data related to Course covered, CIE, Lesson Plans and details of extra-curricular activities. The Chief Mentors are responsible to check the entries in the diaries of the concerned teachers. It was found that issues related to subject knowledge, family relationships and career-related issues were quite commonly encountered by the teachers.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The Continuous Internal Evaluation is carried out for the students of UG and PG. Special emphasis is given to the Slow Learners identified by the Class Mentors. Class Tests, Open Book Tests and Oral Exams are conducted as a part of evaluation after the completion of the Units of the syllabus and Extra Classes taken for the Slow Learners. The slots for all the four Class Tests are mentioned in the Academic Calendar prepared at the beginning of each academic session. The students are informed about the Class Tests at the beginning of the session. The Viva - Voce is also conducted along with Assignments as per the directives of RTM Nagpur University at the end of the Course. The details of the Class tests is mentioned by the teachers in the daily diaries which are submitted to the respective Heads of the Departments for their approval. The answer sheets are shown to the students for rectification. In case a student has any grievance, he or she can approach the Exam Committee to record the grievance.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The College prepares Academic Calendar at the beginning of each academic session. The Academic Calendar is prepared after consultation with the respective Heads of the Departments. Apart from the regular programs, the Heads of the Departments give a tentative schedule of other activities planned throughout the session by them. The general span for the conduction of the Class Tests and the Internal assessments are specified in the Academic Calendar. Accordingly, teachers conduct Class tests in the time period generally allotted four times a year. The Academic Calendar also has slots for extra curricular activities and co-curricular activities. The college is aware and responsive to the infrastructural needs of students and staff members and ensures that new infrastructure is created as per the academic growth. Spacious classrooms, IT labs, language lab, smart classrooms, library resources etc. are created as per the need and demand of time. Starting in 1930, with the old campus at Mahal, over the years the infrastructure has been developed to promote congenial academic environment. The college's infrastructure is more than sufficient to take care of the required curricular, co and extra-curricular activities of around 2000 students enrolled in various courses. There are excellent indoor sports facilities, gymnasium and open courts. We have a canteen for students and staff that provides fresh food at reasonable rates. After dedicating separate classrooms to each section of every course, the spare rooms have been allocated to cells and activity rooms. After the regular teaching as per the time table is over, the same classrooms are used for value added courses. There are number of multi-specialty hospitals for

medical emergency issues. Wheel chairs and ramps etc. are made available for Divyangjans. The institution has sufficient number of rest rooms for students and staff and water cooler on each floor to cater to the needs of students. There is a purchase committee that looks after the infrastructure development. Library: We are using Mastersoft LibMan (cloud version) for Integrated Library Management System. Our library has a rich collection of Reference / Text books (45000), e books (150000) and e journals (4500) and regularly subscribes Journals/Magazines (14), CDs of book (108) and newspapers (14). Library and reference section with computers and access to WiFi remain open for students till 4:30 pm. Arrangements to provide for dedicated computers with internet have been made for accessing N List and other open access consortia services to the faculty and students. We have a Library advisory committee which checks the recommendation of books by teachers and give necessary suggestion for the petterment of library. We have MoUs with five libraries of the cities for interlibrary loan facility. Students' recommendations is also considered for purchase of books. We provide seating facility at reading room with good number of chairs. Library has separate independent building with rest rooms and water cooler. IT Infrastructure: Apart from smart classrooms with audio visual facilities, the college has good IT facility with one computer lab and 63 computers. The campus is wifi enabled with 100 MBPS. Labortories: The college is having English language lab., Psychology lab., and Computer lab. AMCs are signed for the proper upkeep of IT resources. The college has constituted a special committee for maintenance and upkeep of building and equipment. CCTVs are installed at all strategic points for surveillance. There is also arrangement for campus security and housekeeping for cleanliness of institution.

The college believes in decentralization and committee decision making in both academic and administrative matters. The Library is an important resource and the decisions related to book purchase, writing off old books, disposing off the scrap, subscription of journals, budgeting, execution of book bank schemes, inter library arrangements and MoUs are taken either by Librarian or by the duly constituted Library committee. Every member's views are given due consideration. The library committee consists of both genders and include Assistant Professor, Associate professor and Professor grade teachers. Recommendations and suggestions are invited from all types of teachers i.e. permanent, Contributory and Ad-hoc. Once the committee takes the decision, the same is executed by the librarian by following proper SoPs. There is no evidence of superseding committee decision by Principal or Management Committee. College has a huge sports infrastructure and the same is managed by the Sports department which is a completely decentralized set up. The Sports department building is independent and so is its functioning. All sports department and ground maintenance related budgeting, purchasing, scheduling of sports activities, maintenance related activities are managed by the Sports

Committee consisting of all physical education teachers. In this case too, the committee includes both genders and all grades of teachers. The decision related to funding proposals for sports facilities, organizing events and tournaments is the sole discretion of the Sports Committee. The policy related to incentivizing sports persons and providing fee concessions to achievers and performers is also independently handled by the Sports Committee

The schedule of such tests is shared in advance with students and they are also informed on the tool of assessment. Post assessment, the subject teacher's brief the students of the areas of improvement and attention. The idea is to impart higher order cognitive skills and remove the fear of examinations from the minds of students.
Research and Development	This area of institution needs most attention as research inculcates the value of curiosity amongst students and teachers. Every year the college inspires the students to participate is university level research and innovation competition "Avishkar". Teachers who are Research Guides shoulder the responsibility of propagating the research culture at college. Every teacher is given the target to publish research papers or to participate in research conferences and seminars. All the research Scholars submit a six-monthly progress report to Research Advisory Committee.

7.2 Best Practices SHRI BINZANI CITY COLLEGE Umrer Road, Nagpur BEST PRACTICE I Title of the Practice: BINZANI CITY SPORTS ACE PROGRAMME Motto: 'FIT PEOPLE, FIT NATION' Objectives: • To develop physical stamina and promote sport excellence among students. • To provide opportunities to students through various activities / tournaments to enhance their skills. • To maintain the sporting tradition of the College and achieve greater glory. • To stimulate interest and awareness about physical fitness amongst students. Context: Shri Binzani City College has a long tradition of sporting glory and excellence. The College has consistently performed well in University Sports tournaments. The Sports Department of the College trains students for National and International participation. In 2017-18 2019-20, the Team could bag the Kho Kho and Athletics University level Championships. Till date, the department has produced players who have done the College and University proud at the inter-university, state and even national level. Practice • Regular Summer Camps for promotion of sport are being organized on the College ground since 2009. Boys and girls are coached in cricket, athletics, Volley-ball, kabaddi and yoga. Training is given not only by the teaching staff of Physical Education Department but also by outside experts. • Annual Sports Day is organized as a part of the College Day Program or in the month of January for teaching, non-teaching staff, Intercollegiate tournament of Cricket (only for colleges and schools under Nagpur Shikshan Mandal) and students. A variety of indoor and outdoor games are organized. Participation in these games not only gives a recreational break from academic routine but also develops team spirit among staff, NSM office bearers and students. • National Sports Day - Felicitation of Sports persons: The Department organizes a felicitation program every year on National Sports Day commemorating Major Dhyanchand. On this occasion, students showing exemplary performance in Sports are felicitated by presenting a Sports kit. This recognition goes a long way in boosting their morale. • Veterans Competition: The Department organized a Veterans' Competition of Walking and Running as an encouragement and appreciation to the old people connected with the department since years. Through this, the department could include them in the departmental activities. • Medical and Physical Tests: Every year the department holds a Medical and a Physical Tests for all the students of the College. It helps in checking the issues like lack of stamina and exercises faced by the students. Appropriate suggestions like information about nutritious food, regular exercises including yogasana, stress management techniques and stamina building are told to the students by the team of doctors called for the tests. This benefits the Students, especially the girl students, who come from poor background. • The department grooms the students and counsels them on various issues. Some of the issues are related to career and others are related to the tricks of the game they want to excel in. This counseling is done free of cost and in an informal way. SHRI BINZANI CITY COLLEGE Umrer Road, Nagpur BEST PRACTICE II Title of the Practice: GOnGO 'Seva Sarvada Bahu-Uddeshiya Sanstha' Motto: 'JYOT SE JYOT JALATE CHALO' Objectives: • To create awareness amongst students about their social obligation. • To connect the alumni to the present students for their development. • To develop problem solving acumen in the students to deal with situations. • To develop an inclusive approach in education and focus upon holistic development of the underprivileged. Context: Shri Binzani City College has always believed and worked towards creating awareness amongst students about their social obligation. Inspiration in the form of Guest Lectures, activities, visits to Old Ages Homes and Orphanages, and awareness drives is often created. One of the ways is to connect students with NGOs who work for the betterment of the downtrodden and underprivileged. The issue of School dropouts was focused upon and a need to work for such children was created in the hearts of students. Practice • Inspirational Talk: The College Motto '?????? ???????' talks about putting the interests of the other before ourselves. To take this further, we at Shri Binzani City College, Nagpur, strive to develop the students in a holistic way. Inspirational Talks are conducted in the classrooms to motivate students and sensitize them to social issues. Discussions on the underprivileged strata of society sensitizes the students to work for their upliftment. . Connect with NGO: The PG Department of Political Science has taken the initiative to sensitize students in this regard. One of the Alumni of the Department, Mr Khushal Dhak (Batch 2008-09) has started an NGO Seva Sarvada Bahu-Uddeshiya Sanstha since 2005 under the mentorship of Shri Bhau Gawande and Shri Ashutosh Gawande. The NGO was registered in Dt. :5.5.2018 (Registration No : Nagpur/0000309/2018) The NGO zeroed down upon one of the most notorious slum areas of Nagpur City, Rahatetoli, Shatabdi Chowk, Nagpur, to establish their network. The residents of the area belong to a specific sub-group called the Mang - Garudi Samaj. Their main occupation is begging, stealing and rag-picking. Some of them were engaged in making illegal country liquor which posed a great hazard not only to the health of individuals but contributed to make them notorious in the eyes of the others. Since 16 years, the Group has risked their lives and worked primarily for the school dropouts seen rampant in this area. • Activities of the students: The Department of Political Science organizes interactions of Mr Khushal Dhak with the students every year. His life and work has served as an inspiration for many a students. Students get connected with his noble cause and work with him as a part of the NGO. Every evening, around 80-90 children of the slum area gather around the teachers. They are segregated according to age, gender and requirement into several groups. Every group comprises of 7 students with one of them as their Group leader. Some children are enrolled in schools and are taught according to their syllabus. A vast majority of them are dropouts or have never attended formal schools. Such children are taught basics of reading and writing. The need to educate the children in terms of personal hygiene was also identified and is executed. Our Students spend their birthdays and occasions of celebrations with the underprivileged children. One of the girl students distributed Sanitary Napkins amongst the girls of the vicinity. They educated the girls in how to use the pads and maintain hygiene. • Arrange Alumni Interaction: The students who get connected with the NGO are often invited by the Department to share their experiences with the present students thereby creating a chain of like-minded people serving a noble cause. • Evidence of Success: • The number of students who are joining Khushal Dhak's NGO is on the increase. Initially, boys joined the group, but eventually even girl students also took the initiative. • In the recent past, an initiative of the students towards self-employment has taken roots through the establishment of a Training Center. Young girls of the Slum area are taught to work upon sewing machines to generate self-employment. This has changed the way the other

slum dwellers are looking at the work of the NGO. We can hope to witness a seachange in the fabric of that part of society which was till now known only for all wrong things. • The following students of Political Science are associated with the NGO on a regular basis: Sandip Goswami, Nitu Kolhe, Priya Masre, Arpita Thakur, Devyani Randive, Krishna Dahikar, Akhilesh Rathod. They have been vocal about their activities on social media too. Problems Encountered • Reluctance of parents to send their girls to such ill-famed slum areas to work. • Students are unable to devote more time due to pressing demands of their jobs or higher studies.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness: Title: Academic Performance Excellence in Higher Education Introduction: Shri Binzani City College was established in 1930 and has a long lineage of excellence. Former Prime Minister of India, Shri P.V. Narasimha Rao, was an alumnus of the College. The College has various departments. One of which is the Post Graduate Department of Political Science established in 1936 and was granted affiliation in 1970. The Department has since then, produced many stalwarts who have contributed to the Academic wealth in and around Nagpur City. To keep up with the tradition, the College strives to give multiple inputs to its students along with the regular classroom teaching. Practice: Along with academic teaching, for the holistic development of the students, the Department of Political Science takes extra care and initiates Co-Curricular Activities like Guest lectures on contemporary and raging issues, a week-long Higher Learning Education Program, participation of students in Bhartiya Chhatra Sansad to develop leadership qualities amongst the students, Study Tours to places like Hemalkasa (to meet the famous couple, Dr Prakash and Dr Mandakini Amte), Lekha Mendha (to meet the legendary Social Worker Shri Devaji Tofa) and Melghat region (to meet the social workers Dr Ravindra Kolhe and Dr Smita Kolhe).
